Universal and correct wearing of masks		Y	The School will have a face covering policy for students and employees, as required by Executive Order 2020-51. Face coverings are currently optional. The school will provide frequent instruction in proper mask wearing, hand washing, and sneeze/cough control to students and families who continue to wear masks.			
Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding)		Y	The School will encourage staff and students to maintain social distancing (at least three feet apart), when feasible. CCS will remain a closed campus to volunteers and non-essential visitors at all times except for evening family events as specified. Class sizes will remain low to enable more distancing in each classroom and keep cohorts small. To the extent appropriate and feasible, the School will attempt to organize student and staff groupings so that they are as static as reasonably possible – i.e., have the same group of students stay with the same staff, and limit mixing between groups, if possible.			
Handwashing and respiratory etiquette		Υ	The School will encourage and reinforce handwashing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or as appropriate, use of hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol after bathroom use, before and after recess, and at other appropriate times during the day. The School will support healthy hygiene behaviors by providing adequate supplies, including soap and hand sanitizer as appropriate. The School will instruct and encourage staff and students to cover coughs and sneezes and follow hand- hygiene protocols immediately thereafter.			
Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation		Y	The School will clean frequently touched surfaces (e.g., playground equipment, door handles, sink handles, drinking fountains) within the School and on buses (if applicable) at least daily or between uses, when reasonably feasible. The School will follow cleaning and disinfection best practices and procedures, to the extent possible. The School will frequently monitor and service building ventilation systems			



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		to ensure proper operation and circulation of air on campus and school provided transportation. The school provides a unique double air filtration system including: Filterless Hammacher Schlemmer Virus and Allergen Eliminating Filterless Air Purifiers in classrooms, cafeteria, and all other shared indoor spaces with negatively charged ions to eliminate up to 97% of airborne viruses and allergens as small as 10 nanometers partnered with Austin Air Healthmate Plus Air Purifiers in each classrrom proven to assist with allergies, asthma, and other respiratory issues to include medical grade HEPA, Activated Carbon and antimicrobial filter components. To enable safe operations in support of student health needs, improve overall air quality, and reduce other challenges to student respiratory health to include leaks and mold, roofs require full underlayment replacement and some flooring repaired.

To the extent possible, stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, migratory students, children who are incarcerated, and other underserved students will contribute in a meaningful way to planning for campus safety needs.
